Initial management of wounds. The healing of any wound is influenced most by its initial management. Prolonged irrigation with tap water (for more than 10 minutes) should be avoided as its hypotonicity will result in cellular swelling (Moscati et al., 1998). A water-soluble hydrogel placed on the wound prior to clipping will prevent hair from becoming adhered to the wound surface.

BASIC WOUND MANAGEMENT OF HORSES

Wound management in the horse (and other animals) HORSES are incredibly prone to traumatic injury. Unfortunately their surrounding environment is rarely clean and it is not possible to subject horses to bed rest. However, reduction of wound contamination and movement limitation are essential to optimise wound healing and to allow the horse to return to its normal routine and function as quickly as possible.

1. Rinse the wound well. Dirt and debris—including hair, rope fibers, fragments of metal or wood, or dead tissue—can create chronic inflammation and infection that inhibits proper healing and encourages growth of proud flesh.

5 Wound care steps to prevent proud flesh - The Horse ...

Management of Proud Flesh (Exuberant Granulation Tissue) Wounds on horse legs seem to be very prone to proud flesh. Proud flesh is the tissue that is exudes out from the wound and is very vascular, bleeding at only a slight touch. It is bad as it doesn't allow skin cells to move in from the wound edges ie, epithelisation.
