The view is known as nativism and was advocated by Noam Chomsky, who suggested that infants are equipped with a neurological construct referred to as the language acquisition device (LAD), which makes infants ready for language. The LAD allows children, as their brains develop, to derive the rules of grammar quickly and effectively from the speech they hear every day.

Social cognition refers to the awareness of one's own and other people's mental states (i.e., acquiring a theory of mind), including emotions, motives, desires and feelings.
