Tornadoes form when warm, humid air collides with cold, dry air. The denser cold air is pushed over the warm air, usually producing thunderstorms. The warm air rises through the colder air, causing an updraft. The updraft will begin to rotate if winds vary sharply in

Tornadoes start with thunderstorms, which require a combination of warm, moist air near the surface and relatively cold, dry air up higher. The warm air rises; to create the tornado's funnel cloud, there must first be "winds that increase in strength and change direction with height."

"Tornadoes usually occur with thunderstorms and have to do with how the wind turns with height. This is called shear - the turning of the wind and how it speeds up as it heads up into the atmosphere," says April Clark from MetService.

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As the change in wind speed increases in altitude, a horizontal spinning starts at the lower atmosphere. Then, the air rises with the thunderstorms updrafts, causing the horizontal rotation to become vertical. Finally, the lower cloud base becomes a wall cloud and a tornado forms.

How Do Tornadoes Form and Where Do They Occur Most?
Most tornadoes are found in the Great Plains of the central United States – an ideal environment for the formation of severe thunderstorms. In this area, known as Tornado Alley, storms are caused when dry cold air moving south from Canada meets warm

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moist air traveling north from the Gulf of Mexico. Tornadoes can form at any time of year, but most occur in the spring and summer months along with thunderstorms.

A tornado is a type of storm in which powerful rotating winds form a column, which reaches from a cloud down toward the ground. The winds of a tornado are the strongest on Earth. They may reach speeds of up to 300 miles (500 kilometers) per hour. Such violent winds can flatten buildings and whip heavy objects, such as cars, into the air.

The updraft of warm air causes the vortex to swell with water vapor,

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creating a spiraling funnel cloud at its center—the first visible sign that a tornado is brewing. The cool downdraft of air then battles the funnel cloud's upward spiral, focusing the cloud into a smaller area and increasing its speed.
